Message from Pastor Lynn...

### A Habit I Recommend

It's been more years than I care to remember since I read Stephen Covey's classic, *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People.* Since I am fairly ineffective, I can't recall all of them, but the one I recommend most of all to St. Matthew's as you walk through this time of transition is this: begin with the end in mind.

In any enterprise, if you would be successful, it is imperative that you know where you're headed. If you'll allow me to flash the union card, I would say that a teleological perspective is called for. Teleological is 'acadamese' for studying the outcome or trajectory of a thing. You'll notice the Greek root 'telos' which means distant or far (tele-vision, tele-phone, tele-graph). One looks ahead to the hoped-for or expected outcome before charting a course. If you want to go surfing, packing snow shoes makes no sense at all.

St. Matthew's is engaged in a process of charting a course. It is doing more than selecting a pastor. In fact, I assert that choosing a pastor is rather closer to the end of the process than the beginning. The first step is discernment: to determine together the way in which God is calling you as the people of God to fulfill your mission. Secondly, you need to ask yourselves how you might best achieve that goal: what areas you need to strengthen and on which you need to focus. Then, and only then, is it time to ask, what kind of pastor might help us achieve this mission?

The simple thing would be to simply identify the traits you like and don't like in a pastor and try to match those qualities up with the available candidates. If you'll pardon me saying it, that is a very worldly approach to what should be a prayerful and spiritual task. I mean, I understand the urge to look for someone who is not too dull in the pulpit and not too disagreeable in committees, who will visit the sick and troubled and generally not be an embarrassment in public. You probably wouldn't go wrong with using those criteria, but you might be missing just what God has in mind for you. Remember when God sent Samuel to select a king for Israel from Jesse's sons. It was the least auspicious, the runt of the litter that was chosen. The unlikely selection was David, a man after God's own heart.

As you journey through this time of transition, I urge you to pray for your church and for this community that God would lead you to respond to the mission which is your true calling. Pray for your search committee members that they will prayerfully select a candidate who will help you grow in ways that will allow you to fulfill your calling. Pray that God will lead the right person to you as well; that he or she will have keen sense that their proper field of service is here, with you.

Don't rush this thing or focus only on filling a vacancy. Begin with the end in mind. See you in church.

### A look back...

The last quarter of the 19<sup>th</sup> century was a busy one for St. Matthew's. The building committee had purchased land at the corner of Swan and Hagerman for \$1,000 and the cornerstone was laid on August 16, 1868. The building was of brick and within the year the Church opened on February 3, 1869.

The members were Christian Education minded and a school house was erected adjoining the church. Classes were held in German as were the church services. The church and school building cost \$22,000; and in 1870, they held a mortgage for \$9,000.

In 1875, The St. Matthew's Cemetery on Clinton Street in Gardenville was purchased for \$3,000. That same year, St. Matthew's joined the Evangelical Synod of the West and later the Evangelical Synod of North America.

1876 found the congregation purchasing and installing their first pipe organ. It was purchased from a Jewish Synagogue on Niagara Street for \$400 and served the church for 25 years.

In 1880, Buffalo and St. Matthew's was growing and under the leadership of Rev. G. Berner, Friedens Church was organized on Eagle Street.

A steeple was added to the building in 1890 and two bells were installed at a cost of \$1,729. Steam heating was also installed at a cost of \$1,673. Don Ruff, Perry Kaupa, and Kathee Simon are members from the old Church who I'm sure could tell you stories of their experiences of ringing the bells with the long ropes!

In 1896, the school building was enlarged with the money raised by the Young People's Society for \$2,000; and in 1898, under the leadership of Rev. G. Robertus, Christ Church was organized on Clinton Street.

We should be very proud of our forefathers who had a wonderful vision for a meaningful religious life in Buffalo.

## A new mission of St. Matthew's!

The Massachusetts Avenue Project (MAP) is a human services organization on the West Side of Buffalo. Its mission is to nurture the growth of a diverse and equitable local food system and promote local economic opportunities, access to affordable, nutritious food and social change education. In short, they give families access to fresh, healthy food and engage them in growing their own food. MAP does this by operating Mobile Markets, turning vacant lots into community gardens and engaging the neighborhood residents in policy development and planning.



They proudly host the *Growing Green Program*, a youth development and urban agriculture program. At the farm youth work together to grow, market and distribute organic produce for communities, restaurants and retail establishments in Buffalo, learning valuable skills.

St. Matthew's Mission Committee members recently paid a visit to MAP to view their work first hand and determine if we wanted to invest in a relationship with them, through funding and volunteer opportunities. We had a chance to tour the grounds of MAP and saw a new 11,000 sq. ft. urban barn they are finishing up on Massachusetts Avenue. We were very impressed with their mission and successes in reaching and empowering local youth.

Hamburg has a strong history tied to agriculture; if we weren't farming, we were certainly gardening. MAP seems like a good fit for our outreach. The Mission Committee has decided to lend support to MAP's summer program and hopes to work on helping the Mobile Markets in the future.

We are looking forward to a visit by a MAP representative to speak to our congregation on June 10<sup>th</sup>. There will be an opportunity to give a free will offering during coffee fellowship as well as converse with the representative and Mission Committee.

I hope you will be in church that day and will get as excited about this worthy organization as much as the Mission Committee has.
