Message from Pastor Lynn...

# Loving the Rubble

A little while back, during a discussion in our adult Sunday School class, I asked people to share their hopes and dreams for St. Matthew's. One of the people responded, unhesitatingly: "I hope it survives." Now, a lot of so-called experts would expect the pastor to gently, but firmly, encourage the person who said this (and the group who heard it) to aim higher, to have a loftier vision. Not me. I'm all in favor of hoping for survival. It's a worthy goal. In fact, it's pretty biblical. Psalm 102 is one of the great psalms written while the leaders of Israel were being held captive as exiles in Babylon hundreds of miles from Jerusalem and light-years away from its cultural and religious life which they had known and loved. This is a section of that Psalm (vss. 13-18):

You will arise and have compassion on Zion,
for it is time to have mercy upon her;
indeed, the appointed time has come.
For your servants love her very rubble,
and are moved to pity even for her dust.
The nations shall fear your Name, O Lord,
and all the kings of the earth your glory.
For the Lord will build up Zion,
and his glory will appear.
He will look with favor on the prayer of the homeless;
he will not despise their plea.
Let this be written for a future generation,
so that a people yet unborn may praise the Lord.

The psalmist expresses the love people have for Jerusalem and especially the Temple – the places where they had met God time and again and where all the key moments of their lives were placed under the blessing of God's presence. Even in her state of devastation — over-run, plundered, burned, walls and structures toppled and crumbling – she was loved: "your servants love her very rubble."

This rings familiar, doesn't it? Even at the worst of what you have experienced in the last year, even when Sunday attendance is embarrassingly small and the Sunday School is microscopic, "we love her very rubble." We love the church because the most significant moments of our lives occurred there or were celebrated there in the presence of God: births and deaths and marriages and confirmations and our kids' first solos in public and... Sure, some of this feeling is just sentiment and nostalgia, but that's not all it is. We love our church in its magnificence and its rubble, not only for itself and not only because it marks the place where momentous life-events were solemnized, but because we met God there and we know the place is holy.

We long to see our church survive (and flourish) not just to have it for ourselves, but "so that a people yet unborn may praise the Lord." The survival and growth of St. Matthew's is not an end in itself any more than its founding 150 years ago was an end in itself. It is a beloved means to an end: that we might encounter God in this holy place, with these holy people, and together we might worship and grow and reach out in the love we experience to the world for which Christ died. We struggle and sacrifice and hope and dream to pass on the blessing "so that a people yet unborn may praise the Lord."

A look back...

The early 1900's were busy years for St. Matthew's. The church was renovated and a new organ was installed. The original church had 2 aisles with the pulpit in the center. During the renovation, the pews were rearranged and a center aisle was created with the new organ front and center. The organ was dedicated on September 14, 1902 and cost \$3,000.

In 1906, the church burned their mortgage on February 25<sup>th</sup> becoming debt free.

On August 13, 1913, tragedy struck the church with the death of their minister Rev. Bommer and his wife. They were killed in an auto accident in Mayville, NY. After Rev. Bommer's death, the Rev. Davis became the minister and served from 1913 to 1917. He was very Christian Education minded and many advances were made in Sunday school, confirmation classes, and children's choir. As a result, young people were trained in leadership training schools and 6 young men went into the ministry. One of these men was Rev. Herman Fenske who later became St. Matthew's minister for 29 years.

During the first 50 years, 3,734 were baptized, 1,776 were confirmed, and 1,216 were married. The membership was about 400. Services were held both in German and English.

In March, 1934, in Cleveland, Ohio, the Evangelical Synod of North America and the Reformed Church of the United States merged and St. Matthew's became a member of the E & R church of the WNY Synod.

At that time many improvements were made to the St. Matthew's Cemetery. Additional land was acquired and new roads were constructed at the cost of \$12,000. In 1939, a Perpetual Care Fund was established; 25% of the net income was put into the fund. In 1960, the fund grew from \$10,000 to \$93,253.

In 1940, the school building and the steeple were condemned. The steeple was removed and a modern school hall was built.

In 1943, the organ needed work but because of WWII, the work was delayed until after the war. The organ was electrified and chimes were added. The refurbished organ was dedicated on December 28, 1947, in honor of Gordon Brader, William Burden, and Leonard Kohl who died for their country.

On behalf of MAP, thank you for your generous giving.



# **Mid-Year Financial Update**

Income, mainly from offerings at June 30<sup>th</sup> is under budget by \$30,682. General operating expenses are also under budget by \$19,880. This leaves a shortfall (deficit) of \$10,802. If all remains the same, we will have an operating deficit in excess of \$20,000 by year end.

95% of the operating expenses are fixed costs for staffing, utilities, and normal maintenance of the church and grounds.

After your prayerful consideration, any increase to your General Fund offering would be greatly appreciated.
