No Bull

Nothing delights kids of a certain age more than finding something that seems naughty in unexpected places. And what could be a more unexpected place than the Bible? I don't know what budding Bible scholar discovered that in the old RSV, Psalm 50:9 begins with the phrase: "I will accept no bull from your house..."but I do know that all the kids in the Sunday School learned that verse quicker than our assigned memory verses. We were constantly quoting it to one another. Whenever Psalm 50 comes up in the rotation of my daily Psalm readings, I still smile about the way we bandied that verse about.

After all these years, I'm going to quote Psalm 50 at you. I'm not descending again into adolescent insults and I'm not going to quote verse 9. I'm skipping down a few verses to verse 12, in which God speaks to Israel and says:

"If I were hungry, I would not tell you, for the world and all that is in it is mine.

God's message in the psalm is that God doesn't need sacrifices of bulls and goats. God wants righteous living and the sacrifice of thanksgiving.

The psalmist expresses a key element of theology, which those 'in the trade' call Divine satiety. This is just a fancy way of saying God has no needs; God lacks nothing. Therefore there is nothing that we can give God that God doesn't already possess. God doesn't need your bull. Or your goats. Or your house. Or your labor. Or your dedication. Or your paycheck. God can get along just fine with none of these things. God didn't need a helping hand in creating the universe or in dividing the waters of the Red Sea or in raising Jesus from the grave. God has got it covered. If you withhold your efforts, your love, your good will, your wealth and your sweat, God will not suffer loss. God is all sufficient and has no needs.

This may seem like a funny thing to remind people of as a way of kicking off the stewardship program at church, but honesty demands it. If you never give another cent or another minute of your time, if you refuse to give even the least of your efforts or any of the fruits of your talents, God's Kingdom will not collapse and the will of God will not be thwarted. God will not go hungry or be bereft of anything.

God doesn't need you, or me, or anything.

But St. Matthew's United Church of Christ does need you. It needs your money. It needs your time. It needs your talent and your labor. It needs your best thinking and your deepest imaginations. It needs your prayerful support in every way imaginable. God can get by without us, but if we are going to serve God and be available for God's purposes, we have to give of ourselves. Honestly, we all have to give more than we have been giving if we want to continue our ministry in the ways that we currently do.

God doesn't need what we give, but we need to be givers. We need, as Christians, to offer ourselves to God. If you have given your life to Christ, then all that you are and all that you possess is his. Paul calls us to present our very selves as "a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship." (Romans 12:1) Gifts of our time, talent and treasure are the means of placing our selves at God's disposal. Our acts of giving and dedication are the way we act as partners in Christ's ministry and mission. God may not need us, but God wants us; God will use us, and God will bless us if we make ourselves available to serve. Please pray and prepare yourselves to give generously to the ministry of Christ through St. Matthew's.

New Time for Children's Sunday School


Beginning Sunday, October 7, Children's Sunday School will begin at a new time! All children in kindergarten through 5th grade can head to the FROG room after Children's Time



Celebrating A look back...



The next 60 years at St. Matthew's were busy years. The final cost of the new Church was \$257,000 plus furnishings and \$7,000 for the parking lot. A parsonage was bought on Mark Avenue in Hamburg in 1962 for \$22,945. This brought the congregation together in fun and fellowship and love working toward paying off these debts.

Pastor Sandt began his Pastorate on August 1, 1963. He started the Bethel Bible Series by teaching 5 members an intense study of the Bible so they could in turn teach a class

for those interested in the congregation. His confirmands also studied this series and expounded on it for their Lesson Sunday before their confirmation.

Pastor Sandt was a diabetic and woke up one morning to a sea of red and was blind. The congregation rallied behind him and the Lay Reader program was started to relieve him of reading the Scriptures during the service. He was pleased that he was able to continue his services and did not have to leave his ministry. That's the spirit of St. Matthew's - to help and care for one another.

The Women's and Men's Fellowships were very active in monthly meetings and raising money to reduce the debt. Roast Beef Dinners were held spring and fall serving up to 400 people and everyone young and old participating. Kathee Simon's grandmother made a delicious cole slaw that we all looked forward to.



A Pairs and Spare Club was formed for couples and singles and met on Saturday evenings once a month; and so it wasn't just a social club, it was decided to have rummage sales in the spring and fall to help toward the debt. They held square dances, Halloween parties, etc., and great times were had by all.

An Activity Club was started by simply bringing a bag lunch and people enjoyed games and cards and fellowship. This eventually grew into over 100 people attending the 3rd Thursday of the month with a luncheon and entertainment. It was very ecumenical with people coming from near and far. They too had a small bazaar room during the Roast Beef dinners with proceeds going to the debt and eventually to the Schueler Scholarship Fund in memory of their hardworking leader Evelyn

The Choir also grew under the leadership of Dr. Mildred Fischle who had also been at old St. Matthew's. Millie also had a set of chapel bells and formed a Bell Choir which played at special services and in the community.

The youth group had fun on several ski trips and going to Acuna, Mexico for mission trips. They made cement blocks from scratch to construct the building, and Rev. Andy Armstrong remarked after the trip that he learned that "manual labor" was not the Mayor of Acuna!

The Women's Fellowship held several "Serve Fairs" with products from all over the world and the money going to the people who made them. They also published several cook books and had homemade Fastknachts sales during Lent.

A pavilion was built for outdoor activities and Pastor Andy started a 9 AM children's service for half hour each Sunday during the summer. This eventually grew in attendance as people enjoyed getting out earlier to enjoy our summers. Pastor Hanks wanted a longer service which was harder for him to get from a 9AM service outside to a 10AM service inside so eventually, only an outside service was held from late June to early September.

The Sunday School also grew and some years they added a class on the stage. Vacation Bible School also took place with close to 90 to 100 kids attending and eventually went to a combined VBS with St. James and Hamburg Presbyterian churches.

An elevator and enlarged entrance way were added to accommodate those unable to take the stairs.

The St. Matthew's Cemetery also was growing. A new office building and a Chapel were built. The Chapel is in the shape of a ship and our dedicated parishioner Roy Duewiger built the altar, crosses, and lecterns. The altar also has a ship's wheel on the front and Roy carved individual letters of the words, "Jesus Savior Pilot Me" to surround it. The Amish made the pews and it seats 75 people. Sunrise Easter services were held. The Cemetery was holding close to 700 burials a year.

Around 2006, Forest Lawn Cemetery started approaching the Board to purchase the Cemetery. It took a lot of thought for 2 years to make a heart-wrenching decision to sell our beloved Cemetery. Not knowing about the future management of the Cemetery and an opportunity to sell, the congregation voted to sell in October 2008. It is still one of the best Cemeteries around.

The world is changing dramatically and attendance in all churches is decreasing. It is our hope through prayer and God's guidance St. Matthew's will continue to serve our community.
