GOD for Us

If the calendar says it's January, then Jenny Craig, Planet Fitness, or some other foretaste of purgatory is occupying every commercial break on television. Just as the diet-and-exercise-industrial-complex is after you to lose those extra pounds, so too is the Bible-thumper-industrial-complex going to be after you to drop those sins and excess bad habits.

For the record, and speaking on behalf of the Establishment, we are indeed opposed to sin and we would also appreciate an earnest effort to drop at least a couple bad habits in the new year (you know which ones; no need for us to embarrass you in the church newsletter). There.

No kidding, sin is not a laughing matter and if the new year inspires you to self-improvement, I am all for it. Lord knows, I have some self-improvement projects that have been delayed for far too long myself.

But having said that, it isn't sin or bad habits that destroy Christians. Rather, it's despair. To be without hope, to fall into cynicism and despair, reveals that you have lost confidence in God – that you no longer trust God – that you are literally faithless.

Hope doesn't mean we simply close our eyes to racism and prejudicial fears of all kinds. Hope doesn't mean we have to pretend any of these things is getting better at the moment. Hope means that nevertheless, we don't give up. Hope means that we must love mercy, act justly, and walk humbly with God — especially when evil is advancing.

Hope is the trust that God has not been defeated by the power of sin and darkness and therefore neither are we. Circumstances may not be always be in our favor in the year to come. At the end of 2019, there will still be vast areas for improvement in our lives and in the world at large. In the year ahead, we will still be sinners, but we will not lose hope because God is not defeated by our sin or by all the world's evil. Hope keeps us striving even when everything seems arrayed against us, because we know that God is for us.

A Traditional House Blessing for Epiphany

There is an old tradition of blessing one's house on Epiphany in honor of the Wise Men who came to honor the baby Jesus on this day. The custom of an Epiphany house blessing is practiced in some Methodist, Lutheran and Episcopal traditions, but it is more commonly practiced by Roman Catholics. It is a practice that was in place long before our churches divided in the Reformation. The house blessing is especially appealing to children (marking the lintel of the house with chalk!) and it is a great opportunity to remind them that we seek God's blessing in our homes and our hearts on Epiphany and all through the year.



In the Chalking of the Door, we mark our homes with symbols to intentionally set them apart as places of Christian hospitality, as safe and peaceful outposts of the Kingdom of God. Through them we invite God's blessing on all who live and visit our homes. The chalk marks fade, but hopefully the blessing remains indelible throughout the year.

What is traditionally inscribed is this: 20†C†M†B†19. There are two traditional meanings associated with the initials CMB. One relates them to the three Wise Men who are traditionally identified as Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. Another possible origin to the initials is from the Latin phrase: Christus mansionem benedicat, which means "May Christ bless this house." The 20 and 19, of course are for the year.

How to conduct the blessing ceremony:

(You may want to read Matthew 2:1-12 before you conduct the blessing, or relate the story to children who may be present in your own words.)

Leader: Peace be to this house and all who enter here.

All: Amen.

Take chalk (any color) and write on the lintel: 20†C†M†B†19 (Note: The church has white chalk. If you need one, contact the church office.)

Leader: The Magi, C Caspar, M Melchior, and B Balthasar ... came from the east to Bethlehem to adore the Lord 20 two thousand 19 and nineteen years ago. "They went into the house, and when they saw the child with His mother Mary, they knelt down and worshiped him. They brought out their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, and presented them to Him." [Matthew 2:11] May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek and serve Christ in all we meet.

All: Amen.

What Does the UCC Logo Symbolize?

The symbol of the United Church of Christ comprises a crown, cross and orb enclosed within a double oval bearing the name of the church and the prayer of Jesus, "That they may all be one" (John 17:21).

It is based on an ancient Christian symbol called the "Cross of Victory" or the "Cross Triumphant." The crown symbolizes the sovereignty of Christ.

The cross recalls the suffering of Christ - his arms outstretched on the wood of the cross - for the salvation of humanity.

The orb, divided into three parts, symbolizes the world and reminds us of Jesus' command to be his "witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). Our mission is to be Christ's witnesses here at St. Matthew's and in Hamburg. Our witness and mission is extended through Western New York, our state and nation, and the whole wide world through our outreach and partnership with the wider Church.
